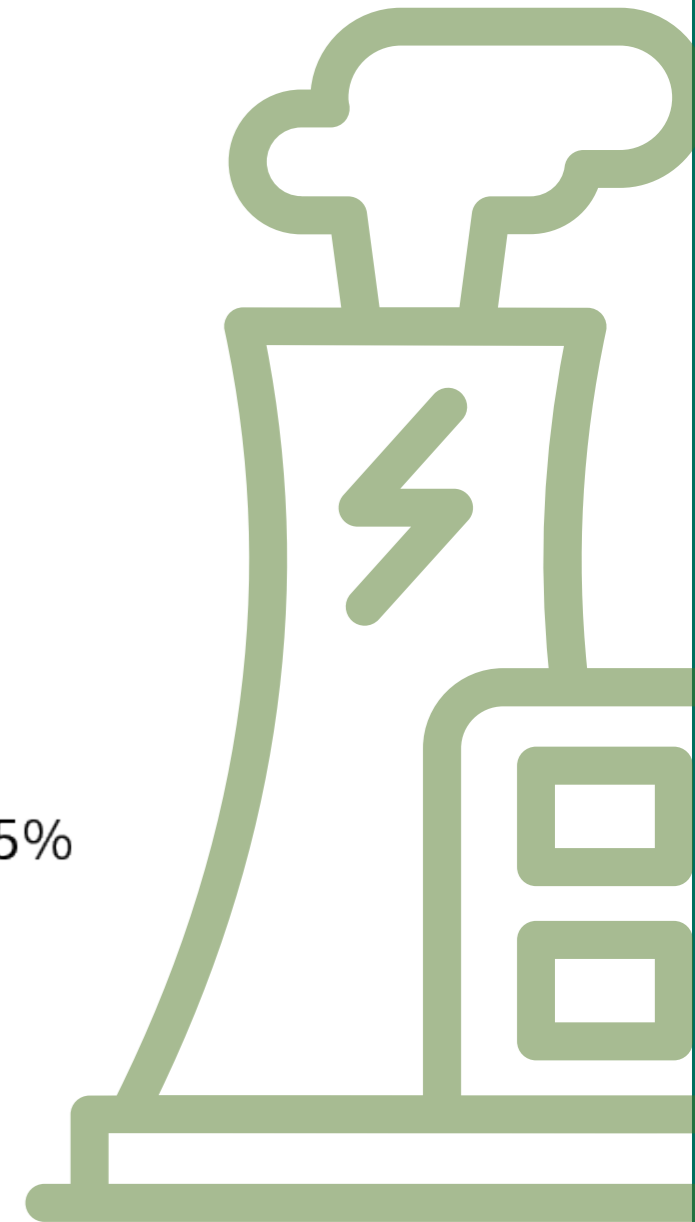
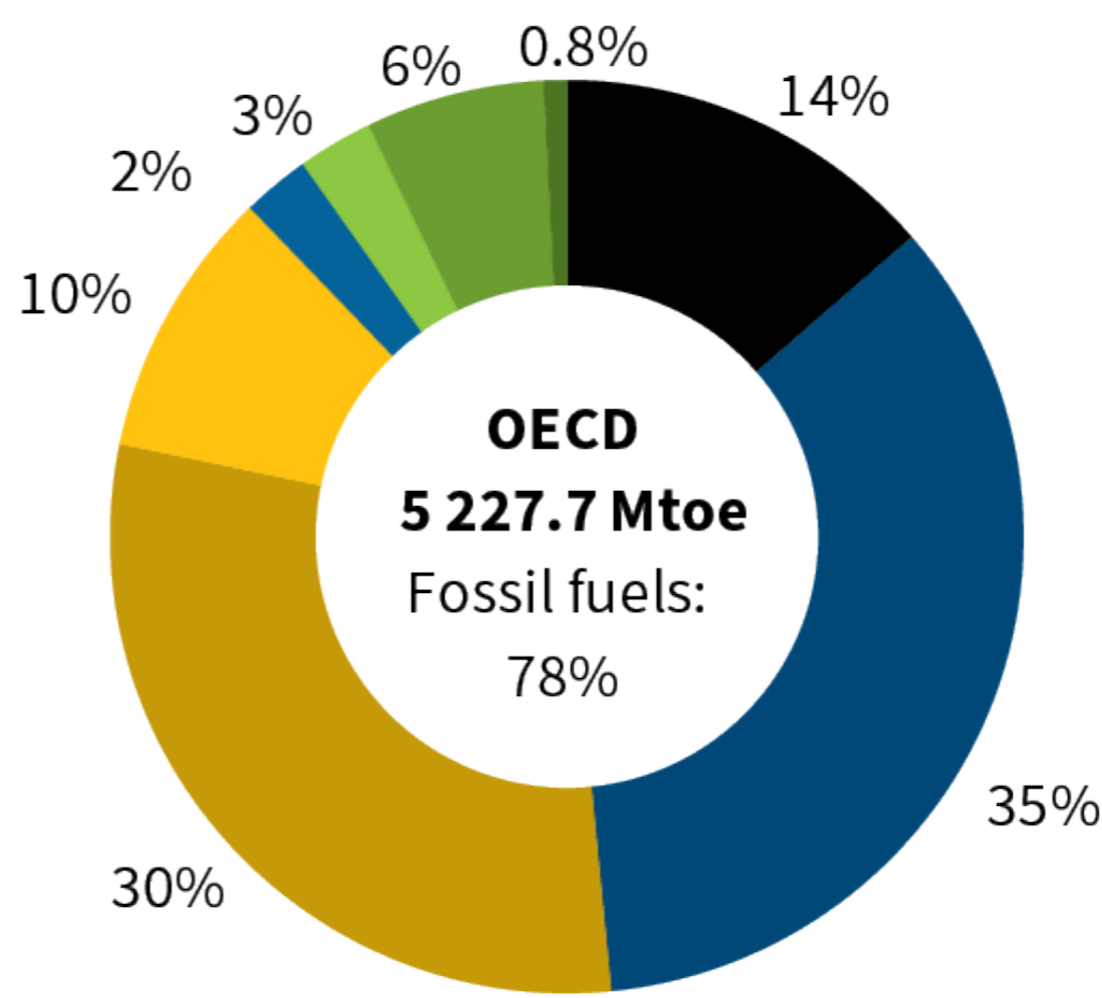
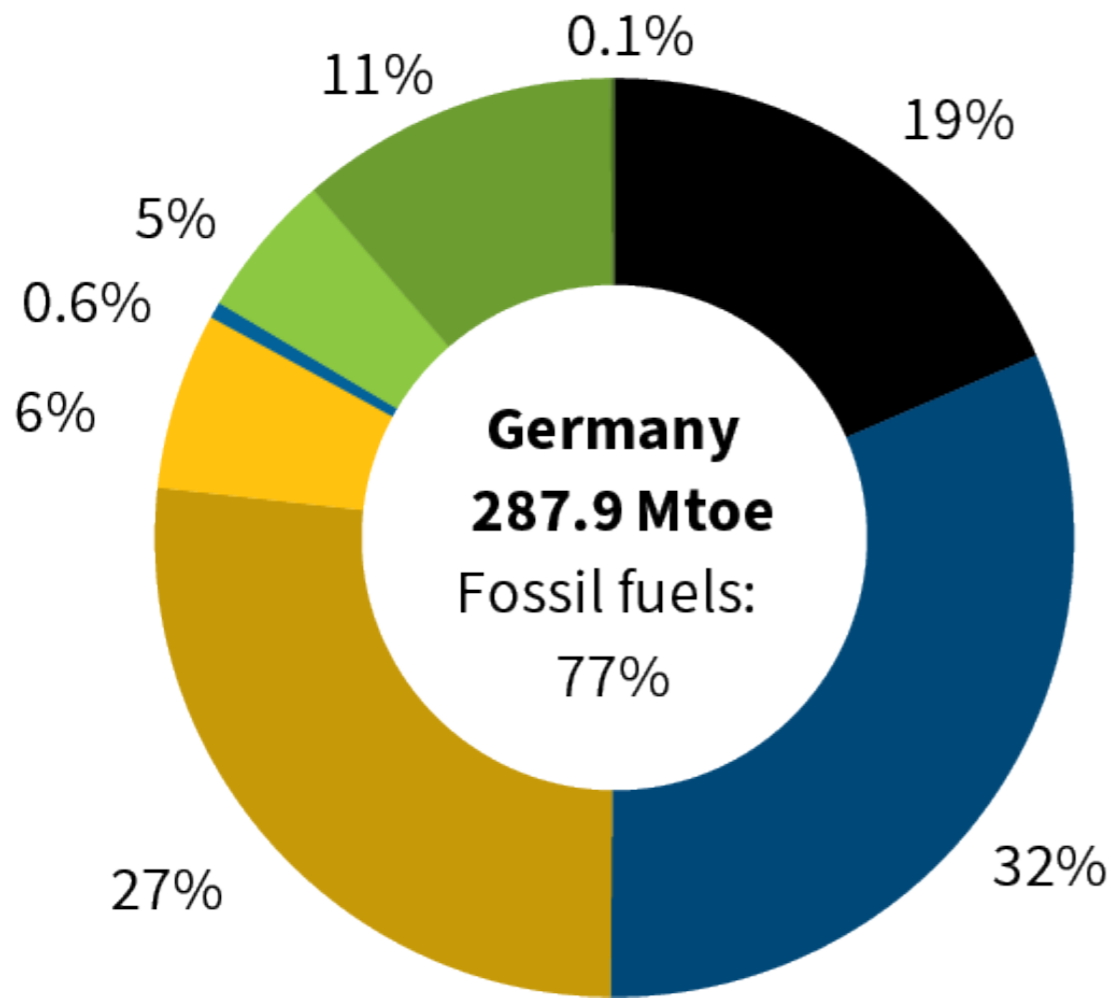




# Germany's energy supply remains carbon intensive despite increases in renewables
