



OECD-ASEAN MOU IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

October 2022

OECD Southeast Asia Regional Programme

On 9 February 2022, the Organisation for Economic Co-Operation and Development (OECD) and the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) in conjunction with the OECD Southeast Asia Ministerial Conference in Seoul, Republic of Korea. The MoU seeks to enhance cooperation between the OECD and ASEAN for a comprehensive, inclusive, and forward-looking partnership in support of the implementation of the Blueprints of the ASEAN Economic Community and the ASEAN Socio-Cultural Community 2025, especially in the post-COVID-19 pandemic.

This new partnership shall strengthen OECD and ASEAN engagement through policy dialogues asnd the development of programmes, projects, and activities in the areas of shared priorities, including on taxation, public finance management, gloval value chains (GVCs), gender, social protection, and sustainability and green growth.

Since the signing of the MoU, OECD and the ASEAN Secretariat have been working closely together to translate this agreement into concrete projects and programmes between both organisations. The following implementation plan outlines the agreed upon activities under this MoU.

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	The Project aims to support ACRF and the implemtation of the OECD-ASEAN MOU to build more sustainable and resilient global supply chains in Southeast Asia. In particular, the project will leverage responsible business conduct (RBC) principles and standards set out in the OECD Guidelines for Multinational Enterprises, as well as use practical tools of the Due Diligence Guidance to help governments and companies ensure that the human protection, environmental, social and other governance issues are central in the design and implementation of policies. 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11) Digital transformation and the Fourth Industrial Revolution ("4IR")	Ongoing: The OECD has started a new project on Extending Connectivity in Southeast Asia, grounded in the recently adopted OECD Recommendation on Broadband Connectivity. The project aims to assess connectivity divides in certain countries in the region (likely to include Singapore, Indonesia, Thailand, Viet Nam and Malaysia) and will identify key provisions of the Recommendation that can help extend connectivity and improve the quality of broadband services across this region. Against this backdrop, the nexus approach herein refers to the analysis of interlinkages, correlations, synergies and trade-offs between sectors. Through the nexus approach, we seek to move away from traditional sectoral thinking toward building a more holistic understanding of the underlying causes of			

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	developmental challenges that could be systemic and structural in nature, and in doing so enable ASEAN to better address them in a more upstream and systematic manner by ensuring sustainability in the mobilisation of limiting resources and reconciliation of conflicting sectoral interests so as to optimise synergies and efficacy.			
	There are clear areas of convergence between the ASEAN Strategic Policy Framework and the OECD's work on multi-dimensional fragility. Moreover, building a more holistic understanding of the underlying causes of developmental challenges is in line with the OECD Development Assistance Committee (DAC)'s Recommendation on the humanitarian, development, and peace nexus. The OECD would be able to provide support to ASEAN in terms of reviewing documents and conducting review sessions on the ASEAN Strategy Playbook on Managing Fraigility and Fostering Greater Understanding and Tolerance, once a substantive draft has been developed by ASEAN.
