

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Consumption Tax Trends* - Canada

GST rate 2022


The Canadian standard GST rate is 5.0%, which is below the OECD average. The average VAT/GST¹ standard rate in the OECD was 19.2% as of 31 December 2022. The previous standard GST rate in Canada was 6% in 2007. It changed to the current level in 2008. Canada also applies a reduced GST rate of 0% to a number of goods and services as well as specific regional rates: a number of provinces have harmonised their sales tax (HST) with the federal GST and levy a GST/HST at the following rates: New Brunswick, Newfoundland and Labrador, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island: 15%; and Ontario: 13%. Québec applies GST at a rate of 5% and Québec Sales Tax at a rate of 9.975%. Temporary specific reduced VAT rates apply in the context of the Covid-19 pandemic since March 2020. GST was introduced in Canada in 1991 at a standard rate of 7.0%. Since then the minimum and maximum standard rates have been at 5.0% and 7.0% respectively.

VAT Revenue Ratio

The VAT Revenue Ratio (VRR) for Canada was 0.48 in 2020, below the OECD average of 0.56. The VRR is a measure of the revenue raising performance of a VAT system. A ratio of 1 would reflect a VAT system that applies a single VAT rate to a comprehensive base of all expenditure on goods and services consumed in an economy - with perfect enforcement of the tax. The Canadian VRR decreased from 0.49 in 2018 to 0.48 in 2020. The lowest VRR was recorded in the year 1992 at 0.43 and the highest level in 2007 at 0.50.

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

The International VAT/GST Guidelines present a set of internationally agreed standards and recommended approaches to address the issues that arise from the uncoordinated application of national VAT systems in the context of international trade.

They focus in particular on trade in services and intangibles, which poses increasingly important challenges for the design and operation of VAT systems worldwide.

They notably include the recommended principles and mechanisms to address the challenges for the collection of VAT on cross-border sales of digital products that had been identified in the context of the OECD/G20 Project on Base and Erosion and Profit Shifting (the BEPS Project).
