



Summary of key findings

Official statistical definition of homelessness (Table 1.BEL)

Belgium follows the definition of homelessness as provided by the European Typology of Homelessness and Housing Exclusion (ETHOS).

Latest national estimates of homelessness (Table 2.BEL)

- 7 134 individuals, representing 0.57% of the total population; data only refer to the Brussels Capital Region (2022)
- · Point-in-time count, based on the Bruss'help street count
- ETHOS Light groups included:
 - ☑ ETHOS 1: Living on the streets, in public spaces
 - ☑ ETHOS 2: Emergency accommodation (e.g., shelters)
 - ☑ ETHOS 3: Accommodation for the homeless (e.g., hostels and women's refuges)

 - ☑ ETHOS 5: People in non-conventional dwellings (e.g., caravans, cars or tents)
 - ☑ ETHOS 6: Living temporarily with others in conventional housing (e.g., sofa-surfing)

Legal framework to collect data on homelessness (Table 3.BEL)

There is no legal obligation to collect data on homelessness in Belgium.

5.1.BEL. Bruss'help street count

Description

Bruss'help performs a nocturnal street count with volunteers in pre-determined locations where people experiencing homelessness are known to congregate. Shelters, homelessness service providers, prisons and hospitals also collect information from people experiencing homelessness through a questionnaire, which aims to collect detailed qualitative information on the profiles, trajectories and pathways into homelessness.

The street count only takes place in the Brussels Capital Region.
