### Towards Inclusive Social Protection Systems in Latin America and the Caribbean

Since 2000, Latin American countries have managed to lift millions of people out of poverty, reduce inequality and build an emerging middle class, thanks to strong economic growth and innovative social policies, the latter mainly in the form of conditional cash transfer programmes. Key public services, notably health care and education, were also improved, both in coverage and quality. This contributed to a notable reduction in inequality, in contrast to the evolution in OECD countries

Despite this social progress, the economic slowdown registered since 2012 has brought to light the vulnerability of the so called *middle class*, with part of this group falling back into poverty. Besides, between half and three quarters of Latin America's middle class work in the informal sector, with limited access to labour training programmes, social protection benefits and pension coverage. Currently, only five in ten middle-income workers contribute to social insurance. Women and youth find significantly more obstacles in joining and remaining in the formal labour market, which limits the important productivity boost that they could give to Latin American economies.

At a global scale, globalisation, ageing and digitalisation are reshaping the world of work, directly challenging the traditional model of social policy that largely depends on regular formal employment. The OECD has been leading global discussions on the transition to new models of social policy and will hold a Ministerial Meeting on Social Policy in Canada during 2018.

Achieving the social inclusion objective in Latin America and the Caribbean goes beyond poverty alleviation. Facing the need to increase the coverage, adequacy and fiscal sustainability of its social protection systems, countries in the region should seize the opportunities that globalisation and digitalisation trends provide and limit the disincentives that they may pose to good-quality jobs and living standards. At the same time, like other emerging economies, Latin American countries may avail themselves of the option of re-engineering policies initially designed to address poverty to meet the needs of not only the poor, but also the middle class.

The Latin America and the Caribbean Regional Programme of the OECD provides a unique platform for engaging in a productive discussion in this field. After the Ministerial on Productivity for Inclusive Growth held in Santiago de Chile in December 2016, this second annual **Ministerial Meeting of the OECD Latin America and the Caribbean Regional Programme** aims to bring together Ministers and other High Level Officials in the fields of Social Protection, Planning, Finance/Budget, to engage in a discussion on the inclusiveness of social protection systems in the region.

The discussion will be facilitated and nurtured by the research and expertise of International Organisations working closely with LAC countries (including the UN ECLAC, the IDB, CAF, the World Bank) and the experience of OECD countries.

	A. Making the tax system more inclusive. Low tax revenues in several countries in Latin America is linked to high levels of informality, which on the one hand limits the base and potential progressivity of income taxes and weakens the contributory systems of social protection. Breaking this vicious circle poses challenges in the creation of public policies and reforms to achieve a tax system that encourages formalisation and leads to greater social inclusion. Participants in the LAC Fiscal Forum, held days before in Asuncion, will present and discuss the main findings in this area.

Between 2003 and 2016, public social spending increased from 7% to almost 9% of GDP, mainly driven by higher health and social protection expenditures (insurance and social assistance). The region also saw a sharp reduction in poverty and inequality thanks to strong economic growth.
