Policies & institutions >> informality (II, III)

Schematic results

- The results on the impact of trade on informality / job quality depend on:
 - Econometric models and data
 - Which segment of informality is being analyzed
 - Differences between country situations
- No clear cut overall tendency
- In any case, few indications that international trade will automatically solve your labour market problems and create decent work

Back to square 1?

- Central role of policies and institutions
- Lower cost of formality, enforcing regulations, increasing benefits of formality (de Laiglesia)
- Recent experience of several Latin American countries in reducing informality (Brazil, Uruguay, Argentina, Paraguay)
- Exceptionally successful against “opportunistic informality”, more structural forms may be more difficult to tackle

Future research

- Better data allows better quantitative research (convergence toward ILO definition that captures both employment in informal economic units and informal employment in formal enterprises?)
- However, better results likely on very specific time-bound experiences rather than big overall picture
- If institutions matter, how can they be incorporated into research (number of labour inspectors per 1000 workers? Indicators on quality of institutions?)
- Alternatively, more qualitative approaches (commodity chains, Varieties of Capitalism, etc.) may also help
