

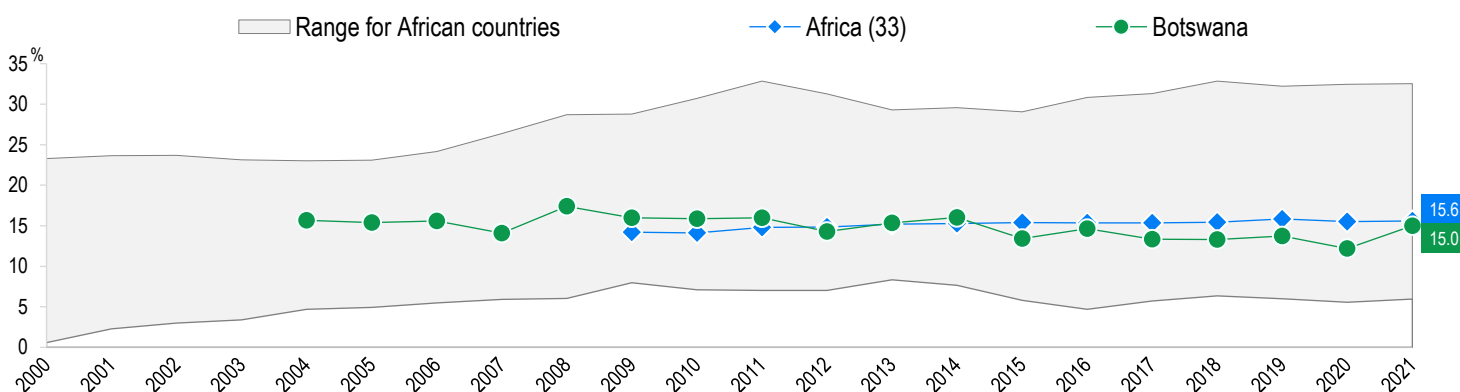


Revenue Statistics in Africa 2023 — Botswana

Tax revenues: tax-to-GDP ratio

Tax-to-GDP ratio over time

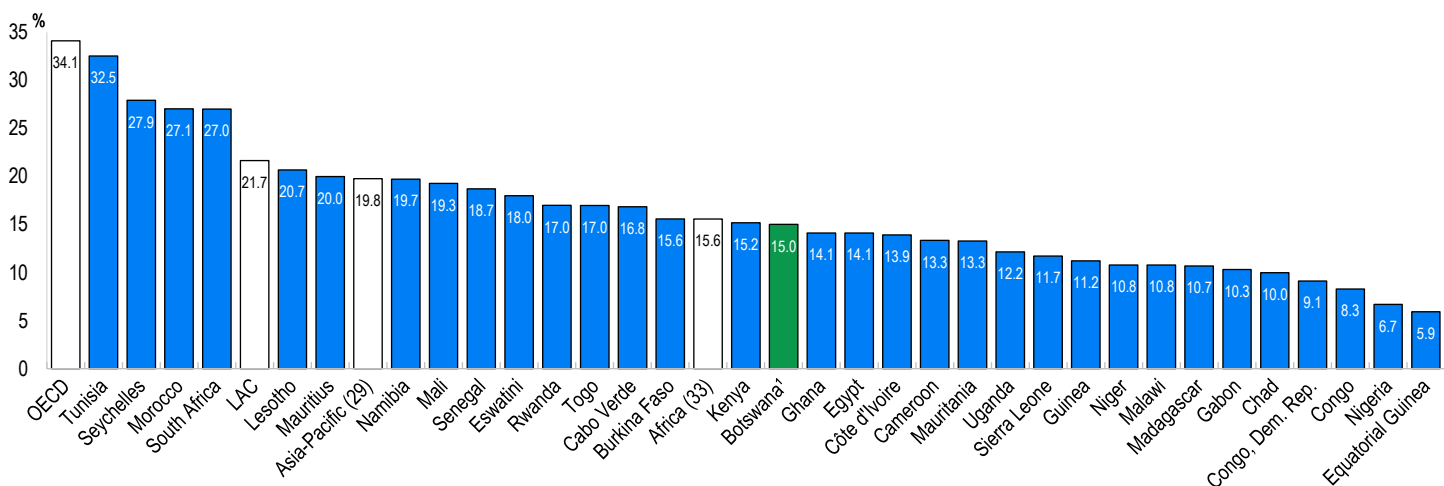
The tax-to-GDP ratio in Botswana increased by 2.8 percentage points from 12.2% in 2020 to 15.0% in 2021. In comparison, the average* for the 33 African countries within the Revenue Statistics in Africa 2023 publication has remained unchanged over the same period, and was 15.6% in 2021. Since 2010, the average for the 33 African countries has increased by 1.5 percentage points, from 14.1% in 2010 to 15.6% in 2021. Over the same period, the tax-to-GDP ratio in Botswana has decreased by 0.8 percentage points, from 15.8% to 15.0%. The highest tax-to-GDP ratio reported for Botswana since 2000 was 17.4% in 2008, with the lowest being 12.2% in 2020.



* The Africa (33) average is not available before 2009 due to missing data in some countries. In 2009, it is calculated based on estimated tax-to-GDP ratios for Chad, Gabon and Nigeria in that year, as data were not available prior to 2010 in these countries. Annual changes are rounded to one decimal place. Due to rounding, sums and differences of reported figures might differ from the actual values.

Tax-to-GDP ratio, 2021

Botswana's¹ tax-to-GDP ratio in 2021 (15.0%) was lower than the average of the 33 African countries in 2023 (15.6%) by 0.6 percentage points.



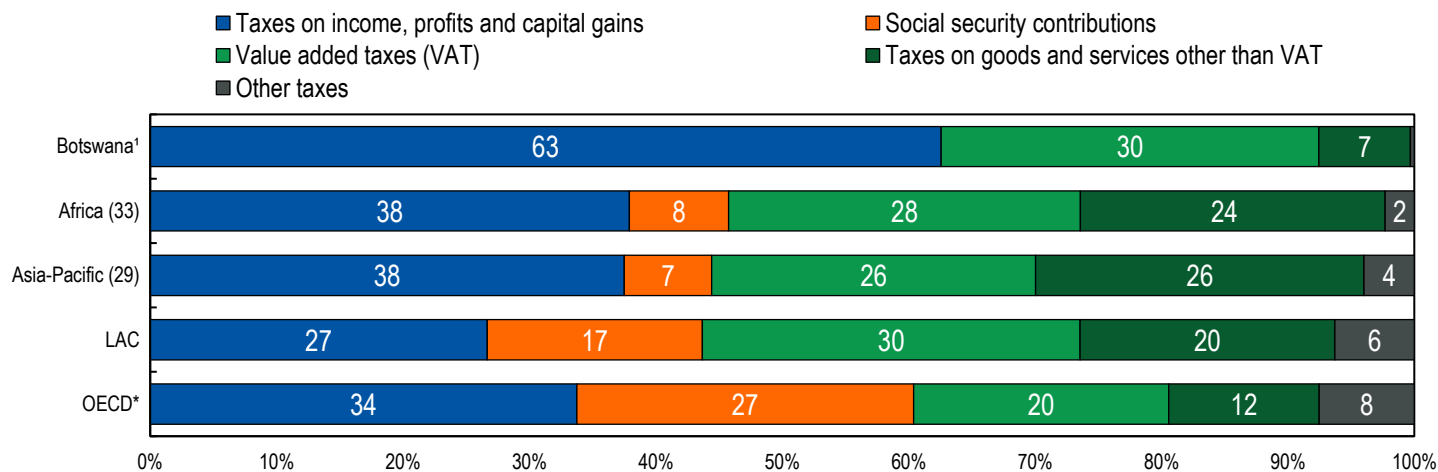

In the OECD classification the term "taxes" is defined as compulsory unrequited payments to general government. Taxes are unrequited in the sense that benefits provided by government to taxpayers are not normally in proportion to their payments. Non-tax revenues are all other government revenues that are not classified as taxes. Tax revenues: structure

Tax structure refers to the share of each tax in total tax revenues. The highest share of tax revenues in Botswana¹ in 2021 was contributed by taxes on income, profits and capital gains (63%). The second-highest share of tax revenues in 2021 was derived from value added taxes (VAT) (30%).

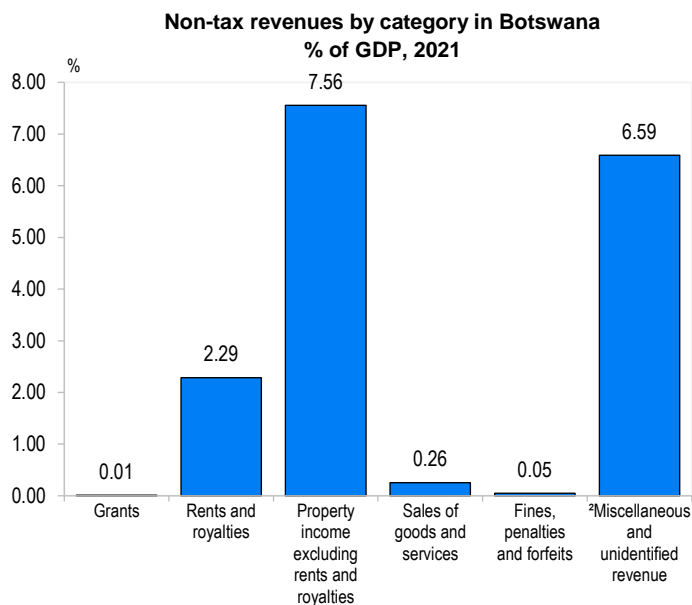
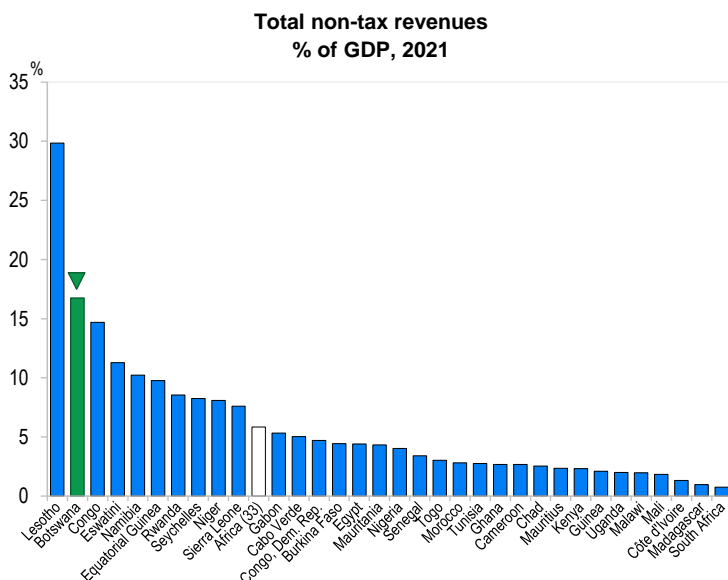


¹ The breakdown of revenue from income tax by 1100 personal income tax and 1200 corporate income tax is not available. Social security contributions for Botswana are deemed to be null as they do not meet the criteria to be classified as social security contributions set out in OECD interpretative guide.

* The data for the OECD are for 2020 as the data for 2021 are not available. Due to rounding, these reported percentages might not add up to 100%.

Non-tax revenues

In 2021, Botswana's non-tax revenues amounted to 16.7% of GDP. This was higher than the average non-tax revenues for the 33 African countries (5.8% of GDP). Property income excluding rents and royalties² represented the largest share of non-tax revenues in Botswana in 2021, amounting to 7.6% of GDP and 45.1% of non-tax revenues.



² The majority of the 'Miscellaneous and unidentified revenue' category comes from the Southern African Customs Union (SACU) revenue sharing agreement.
